^The normal transit capacity of the Panamax locks is 34-36 vessels per day, and in the Neopanamax locks 9-11 vessels per day, depending on vessel mix, transit restrictions, and other factors. The maximum sustainable capacity of the Panama Canal (Panamax and Neopanamax locks) is approximately 38 vessels per day. This capacity is reduced during locks maintenance work, as indicated in the above table. The capacity may also be reduced based on the level of Gatun Lake. Consequently, vessels may experience delays in transiting. When the Panama Canal's capacity is expected to be reduced, a corresponding adjustment to the number of available reserved transit slots may be ordered by the Canal Authority. Whenever a set of locks requires a major outage of one of its two lanes for dry chamber inspection, miter gate repairs, tow track work or other major maintenance/improvement projects, advantage may be taken to perform simultaneous single lane outages at other locks.

Panamax locks

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The driest month of October since 1950

The Panama Canal announces new operational measures with nearly 50 days remaining in the rainy season



This month of October is the driest on record within the past 73 years. The drought caused by the El Niño phenomenon continues to impact the Panama Canal's reservoir system and, as a result, water availability has been reduced.

What has happened? In 2023, there has been 41% less rainfall than usual, lowering Gatun Lake to unprecedented levels for this time of year.

Therefore, with less than two months left until the end of the rainy season, the Canal and the country face the challenge of the upcoming dry season with a minimum water reserve that must guarantee supply for more than 50% of the population and, at the same time, maintain the operations of the interoceanic waterway.

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New measures

Against this backdrop, the Panama Canal announces reservation slots available to maintain a competitive draft from November until February.

They are established as announced on Advisory to Shipping No. A-48-2023:

These measures are in addition to those previously adopted to preserve fresh water resources and to ensure the safety of transit operations, such as the use of water reutilization basins in the Neopanamax Locks and cross-filling in the Panamax Locks.

The Panama Canal urges its customers to make reservations in order to transit as programmed. In addition, information is provided in advance, as well as in real time, so that shipping companies can plan and make the best decisions.

Canal specialists remain vigilant of climate variability and rainfall patterns to implement actions to ensure that operations remain safe, efficient, and competitive for the benefit of Panama and world maritime commerce.
